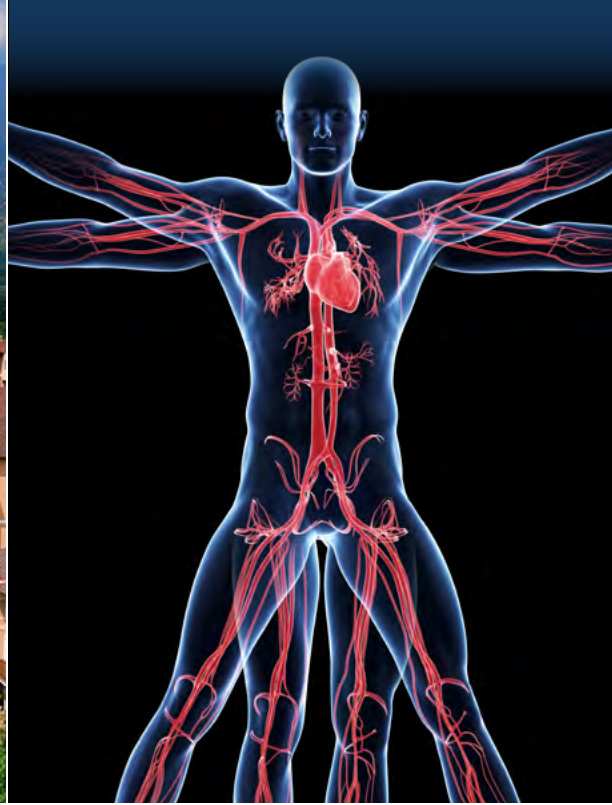

PRESIDENTIAL INVITED GUEST LECTURER TODD E. RASMUSSEN, MD

Leave no one behind: leadership amidst the odyssey to advance casualty care and improve wartime survival

Todd E. Rasmussen, MD is Professor and Vice Chair of Education in the Department of Surgery at Mayo Clinic and a Senior Associate Consultant in the Division of Vascular and Endovascular Surgery. Dr. Rasmussen earned his medical degree from Mayo Medical School in 1993 and completed surgical residency at Wilford Hall Medical Center at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas. He returned to the Mayo Clinic where he completed vascular surgery fellowship in 2001.

Dr. Rasmussen joined the Mayo practice in 2021 after a twenty-year career as an Air Force surgeon during which he completed deployments to Iraq, Afghanistan, and other parts of the world, and led research programs for the Department of Defense. Dr. Rasmussen's research and innovation have resulted in more than three hundred publications, an h-index of more than sixty and more than twenty thousand citations. He has patents in REBOA and vascular shunt technologies and has collaborated with industry and the FDA to study a new blood vessel technology grown from human cells. Among several military awards, Dr. Rasmussen was presented the Defense Superior Service Medal upon retirement at the rank of Colonel in 2021.
